THE GAMESMAN. By Michael Maccoby. New York: Bantam Books, 1978. Pp. 302. \$2.75.

Dr. Maccoby's study, based on seven years of extensive interviews with hundreds of middle and top corporate managers and fifteen of their wives and secretaries, is a provocative study and redefinition of modern executives. Out of the basic and more typical types of executives has sprung a new type of executive, the "Gamesman," whom Dr. Maccoby describes as a fast-moving, flexible winner who loves changes and challenges, but who, at his worst, can be unrealistic, manipulative, and a compulsive workaholic. A well-written, well-researched psychological study of the different breeds of modern executives.

1976 DIGEST OF UNITED STATES PRACTICE IN INTERNATIONAL LAW. Edited by Eleanor C. McDowell. Dep't of State Publication, 1977. Pp. 850.

This book represents the fourth annual digest of the series and once again is a comprehensive and well-edited compilation of the significant 1976 developments in United States practice in international law. It was a busy year for United States international law. Included in this volume are such important developments as the new Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act, Supreme Court decisions on the act of state doctrine, and documents relating to the implementation of the 200-mile fishery conservation jurisdiction.
