BASIC DOCUMENTS IN INTERNATIONAL LAW. Edited by Ian Brownlie. London: Oxford University Press, 1972 (2d ed.). Pp. x, 284. \$4.50.

This work complements the typical "casebook." It emphasizes modern treaties, conventions, and other important contemporary sources of international law.

LAW AND INTERNATIONAL LAW: A BIBLIOGRAPHY OF BIBLIOGRAPHIES. By Theodore Besterman. Totowa, New Jersey: Rowman and Littlefield, 1971. Pp. x, 436. \$20.00.

A collection of bibliographies published throughout the world arranged alphabetically by specific subjects. Broad subject headings include Laws, International Law and Relations, Criminal Law, and Laws by Places.

CONFLICT ISSUES AND INTERNATIONAL CIVIL AVIATION DECISIONS: THREE CASES. By Young W. Kihl. Denver: 1970-1971 Monograph Series in World Affairs, University of Denver, 1971. Pp. xi, 96. \$1.00.

The author discusses the institutional setting of the International Civil Aviation Organization, and the political processes in the operations related to the ICAO and international civil aviation. He then analyzes three recent cases in the domain of international civil aviation in this context.

THE INTERNATIONAL COFFEE AGREEMENT: A STUDY IN COFFEE DIPLOMACY. By Bart S. Fisher. New York: Praeger Publishers, 1972. Pp. xx, 287. \$17.50.

Commodity support agreements often are plagued with conflicts among producers over market shares and conflicts between producers and consumers over price levels. Dr. Fisher reviews the economic and political problems inherent in commodity agreements, and then analyzes specific problem areas of the International Coffee Agreement and the reasons for its atypical success.

LAW AND POLITICS IN OUTER SPACE: A BIBLIOGRAPHY. By Irvin L. White, Clifton E. Wilson, and John A. Vosburgh. Tucson, Arizona: University of Arizona Press, 1972. Pp. vii, 176. \$6.95.

A comprehensive collection of materials grouped by topic and source. This book provides extensive coverage of books, bibliographies, articles, conferences and United States government and United Nations materials.

PETROLEUM ECONOMICS AND OFFSHORE MINING LEGISLATION: A GEOLOGICAL EVALUATION. By A. P. H. van Meurs. Amsterdam: Elsevier Publishing Company, 1971. Pp. xi, 208. \$10.45.

The author discusses the political and legal problems of the petroleum industry. He concludes with practical considerations necessary for comprehensive mining legislation, particularly offshore mining legislation.

CIVIL STRIFE IN LATIN AMERICA: A LEGAL HISTORY OF U.S. INVOLVEMENT. By William E. Kane. Baltimore: The Johns Hopkins University Press, 1972. Pp. ix, 240. \$10.00.

The author recounts the history of United States involvement in Latin America with particular reference to the threat to national security as perceived by the United States Government. He concludes with case studies of three recent American interventions in Latin America—in Guatemala, Cuba, and the Dominican Republic.

SELF-DETERMINATION IN INTERNATIONAL LAW. By U.O. Umozurike, Hamden, Connecticut: The Shoe String Press, Inc., 1972. Pp. xiii, 324. \$16.50.

Dr. Umozurike traces the development of self-determination and attempts to show that the principle has matured into a principle of positive international law. Evidence is drawn from the practice of the United Nations, state practice, and the writings of eminent jurists.

LAW AND PROCEDURE OF THE STOCK EXCHANGE. By Geoffrey Cooper and Richard J. Cridlan. London: Butterworth & Co. (Publishers) Ltd., 1971. Pp. xxii, 291. \$16.50.

This volume provides a comprehensive analysis of the London Stock Exchange. The authors explain the history and constitution of

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the Stock Exchange, and trace the admission of securities to quotation and the procedures for dealing in them, the formation of bargains, the procedures for settlement and transfer, and the remedies for breach of contract and default.

AN INTRODUCTION TO THE LAW OF THE EUROPEAN ECONOMIC COMMUNITY. Edited by B. A. Wortley. London: Manchester University Press, 1972. Pp. x, 134. \$6.50.

This collection of lectures provides an introduction to the problems that are likely to be encountered by England after it joins the European Economic Community. Specific problem areas include: the establishment of a generally understood meaning of the EEC Treaty, the modification of company laws to meet the requirements of the Treaty and the treaty provisions on competition, monopolies and restrictive practices.

CITATION RULES AND FORMS FOR UNITED NATIONS DOCUMENTS AND PUBLICATIONS. By Marie H. Rothman. Brooklyn, New York: Long Island University Press, 1971. Pp. vi, 64. \$1.95.

This pamphlet provides a comprehensive source of citation rules for most United Nations documents and publications.

AMERICAN-GERMAN PRIVATE INTERNATIONAL LAW. By Ulrich Drobnig. Dobbs Ferry, New York: Oceana Publications, Inc., 1972 (2d ed.) (No. 4 in BILATERAL STUDIES IN PRIVATE INTERNATIONAL LAW, Nina Moore Galston, Editor). Pp. x, 510. \$17.50.

This book, initially entitled AMERICAN-GERMAN PRIVATE LAW RELATIONS CASES 1945-1955 and written by Dr. Martin Domke, has been completely revised and now covers the entire spectrum of American-German legal relations.
