organization, substantive rights and procedural problems under the Taft-Hartley and Wagner Acts. There is no attempt to exhaust or to annotate completely the topics covered, but the book is a helpful supplement and guide to "trouble spots."

The book is provocative without being belligerent, the author freely expressing his own opinions of Taft-Hartley innovations and other phases of federal labor law. In general, he disapproves of the Taft-Hartley Act but does not recommend a complete elimination of its provisions. This conclusion is not surprising in the light of the "premises" which he sets forth in his Preface (pp. vii-viii), and which he might better have placed in the conclusions following his analysis rather than as the preliminary basis of such analysis. An appendix includes the complete text of the Labor-Management Relations Act of 1947 (The Taft-Hartley Act).

TENNESSEE PERSONAL INJURY FACT DIGEST. Compiled by Eugene McSweeney. Nashville: The Fact Digest Co., 1949. Pp. 124. \$5.50.

This small volume is a useful accessory to the traditional digest. Unlike the Michie or West digests, it makes no attempt to analyze the legal principles involved in the cases or to indicate the holdings. Instead, it merely collects together citations of Tennessee cases for various typical fact situations. Major headings include the titles of Motor Vehicles, Falling, Electricity, Elevators, Explosives and Malpractice. Each of these is broken up into numerous subtitles. Paragraph entries are factual in nature—*e.g.*, "Automobile running fast, skidding and going on to pavement, where it struck pedestrian. *Core v. Resha*, 140 Tenn. 408; 204 S. W. 1149." There is a table of cases, and pocket in the back, apparently for supplements.
